- January to June -- Common area build out
- June to December --- Attaching of units



Parts for our new satellite dishes are here. The new dishes have over four times the area and will be concrete mounted to avoid both the present interference and movement problems.

OpticalTel has been onsite for three Wednesdays. For over 20 hours they have answered non-stop questions one-on-one with our residents. Many residents have signed up for new services. OpticalTel's next scheduled visit is during the vendor expo during our Love the Summit weekend. The rest of this article contains answers to the most common questions asked by our residents:

As of February 1, we are under the pricing terms of the new contract. This works out to our advantage. OpticalTel is increasing the base Internet speed from 6mpbs to 10mbps at no increased cost to us. Now we are entitled to two HD boxes without deposit or rental and to discounts for the purchase of multiple additional services. OpticalTel said that they will work throughout February to automatically adjust our accounts for these savings.

Snowbirds can now stop and start the optional HD, internet and telephone services seasonally without charge. Note that snowbirds with DVR(s) must continue to pay \$7.95/month that passes straight through to the content providers.

You should call OpticalTel to review your bill and products (or refunds for your boxes.) During this period (before fiber) you can continue to change and add any of the TV, internet or telephone services. If you add internet or telephone services you will receive the appropriate cable modem for use until fiber is available to your unit. As has been always true, if you want wireless internet (WiFi) in your unit you will need to have a router. Note that the AT&T modem/router will not work.

OpticalTel's current network will continue active during this migration over to fiber and will continue active until December 31, 2014 to facilitate installations for snowbirds. Although the transfer to fiber based service should be seamless for your Video and Telephone Service, it is important to remember OpticalTel MUST enter into your unit with a resident present to install an Ethernet port for your Internet Service. Any wiring needed for your Internet and Phone Service will be done at no charge by OpticalTel as long as you subscribe to these services

with them. After these changes you will no longer use your cable modem for internet and telephone. You can also schedule an OpticalTel technician to come out and do a site survey and determine if your coaxial cabling will be adequate to deliver Video Service on the new fiber network.

Reminder -- Storage Available – Denise Smith

Do you need more space? Are your holiday decorations in the way? Are your golf clubs and important papers taking up too much floor space? Consider renting an A-Closet.

Half of the A-Closets have already been rented, but that means there are still half available. The South Tower has a few Jumbo closets still available. The North Tower has both Large and Jumbo closets.

Rental fees from the A-Closets go directly into the operating fund, thus helping to reduce our future maintenance costs. If you are interested, just contact the office for details.

Our Community Emergency Response Team

Five members of our community finished the 16 hour course with the Ft. Lauderdale fire department in CERT training. We learned through lectures and practice how to better deal with emergencies and dangerous situations including how to recognize and deal with various emergencies, how to work with our emergency services, stopping bleeding, how to do basic triage in a crisis, and what to do, and not to do, in the case of a fire. We experienced the dangerous narrow focus that take over our thinking when we are not trained to deal with an emergency.

We are working with Hollywood to see if we can establish continuing education in coordination with their fire department. Ft. Lauderdale is offering another CERT course in April. What part of “Turn Off Your Unit’s Water When You Are Away” don’t some people understand?

We know that some snow birds leave their unit water on when they leave for the season. We know that many owners who have not had their plumbing inspected or updated for more than a decade. Some still even have the decades old non-reinforced rubber hoses on their washing machines. We know this because of the leaks we have from time-to-time that damage our units. Sometimes the resulting floods have made several units underneath uninhabitable.



Unit owners are absolutely responsible for maintaining their units. Over the years we need to bring professionals in to check out and update our units. If you have one of the maintenance services such as Service America or Total you could ask them check out your unit.

In a detached home lack of maintenance only destroys one’s own property. In a multi-dwelling unit you can cause almost unlimited damage to other’s properties.

This is a good time to make sure your unit’s insurance policy is up-to-date to help provide some help in recovering from someone else’s carelessness. Unit insurance may also help you deal with the potentially very large liability that a problem in your unit can cause others.

Organizing Our Blueprints

Every time we have a significant change to unit or a common area, these need to be produced by the owner’s or Association vendors. The job was made more difficult because of many duplicates and improperly filing.

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Landscaping Committee – Laura Naron

The Summit's campus is over 9 acres, with a good part of it green. The pool deck is 2 ½ acres. We are the biggest private green area on Hollywood A1A. Keeping us green outside is a big job with many components including our sprinkler system and the proper timing of annuals. In order to save water (and money) we have installed moisture detectors that keep the sprinkler system from running when unnecessary.

Inside our building we also need to manage the plants and flowers. We have committee members that water some of the plants in the lobbies. We are now considering a new layout, new pots and plants for the lobbies. Now both the decorating and landscaping committees are involved with making these decisions.

Residents leaving for the season and people just not wanting their non-blooming orchids can give them to us. We put them in the trees on the beach walk for all to enjoy when they re-bloom. These and all our plants are for us all to enjoy. Last year someone destroyed a plant while picking a blooming orchid.

We have an herb garden where all are free to pick. It is small so pick only a few leaves to leave some for others.

Even though you live in a condo and you are a snow bird you can still get your hands dirty. The landscaping begins on the pool deck to inspect plants and care for the garden. Some people have their special area they look after whenever they are free. Sign up in the office and just look for us on the pool deck almost every Sunday morning at 10:05.

Volunteering at the Summit

- Two **swimming pools** -- no lifeguards, join group water exercise in west pool M-F 8-9
- Two **Tennis courts** - in back, pick up team Daily 8
- Separate **Cardio & Weight Gyms** --3rd floor both towers. Please practice posted gym etiquette rules. Men's bathroom/shower/sauna attached to cardio gyms. Women's bathroom/shower/sauna attached to weight gyms.
- **Shuffle board** -- SE corner of property, equipment at front desk, pick up team M/W/F 1:30-3:30,
- Two **Card rooms** in each tower (3rd floor)
- **Internet hotspots** - North & South Towers' east Card rooms & near Café (all provided by OpticalTel). See **Internet** on MySummit.org. Also try next door public library 1301 S. Ocean Drive (M-F 10-6)
- **Libraries** (Reading rooms) - 2nd floor both towers. Take or leave books.
- **Game rooms** - 3rd floor both towers, including video game consoles, supplies at front desk
- **Billiard rooms** -- 2nd floor both towers, equipment at front desks
- **Ping-Pong** -- 3rd floor game room north tower, equipment at front desk
- **Bike Storage** - 3rd floor garage, register bikes in office - use beach elevator to reach Broadwalk, walk bikes in garage. Adult tricycles storage area -- NE corner of 1st floor garage.
- **Parking facilities** -- See office or MySummit.org for rules. Subject to availability, annual or monthly spaces may be rented in office.
- **Putting green, 1/2 basketball court, bocce ball court, horseshoe pit & golf pitching net** -- on beach side of towers -- basketball, bocce and horseshoe supplies at south front desk
- **Soda vending machines** -- on 1st floor garage next to tower entrances in both towers
- **Kayak Storage** -- garage 3rd floor NE corner -- See office with questions or to reserve a spot with a check - \$120/boat/year
- **Beach Bins** -- garage 1st floor SE corner -- See office with questions or to reserve a spot with a check. Annual rental amount depends on bin size (\$60 to \$180/year)
